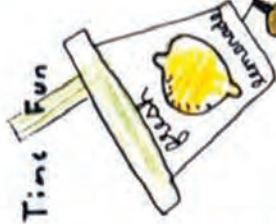

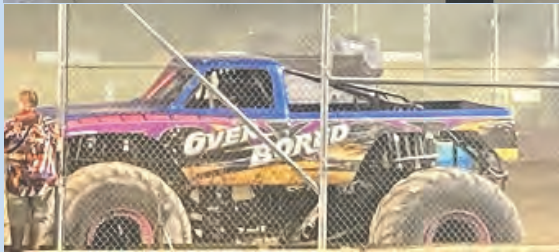

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Spray 9"x13" baking dish with non-stick cooking spray. In a large bowl, combine ingredients for the cake EXCEPT the melted butter.

While the mixer is running, slowly add the 1/2 cup of melted butter. Mix just until combined.

Spread the batter evenly into the sprayed baking dish

FOR THE CINNAMON FILLING

In a small bowl, combine all of the filling ingredients: softened butter, brown sugar, flour & cinnamon. Stir until combined well.

Drop the cinnamon filling by the spoonful onto the cake batter.

Take a butter knife and make swirly, marble-effect patterns all around the cake. Drag the knife through both the cinnamon and the cake batter.

Bake the cake for 30-45 minutes, until a knife inserted into the center comes out clean.

FOR THE GLAZE

Whisk together the powdered sugar, milk & vanilla extract in a small bowl.

Pour the glaze over the warm cake.

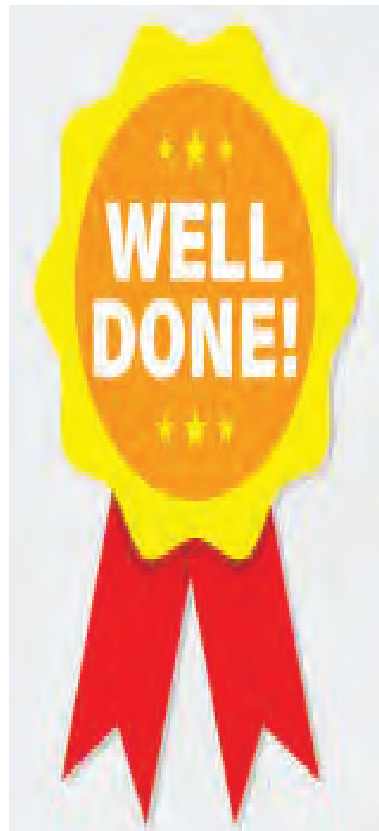

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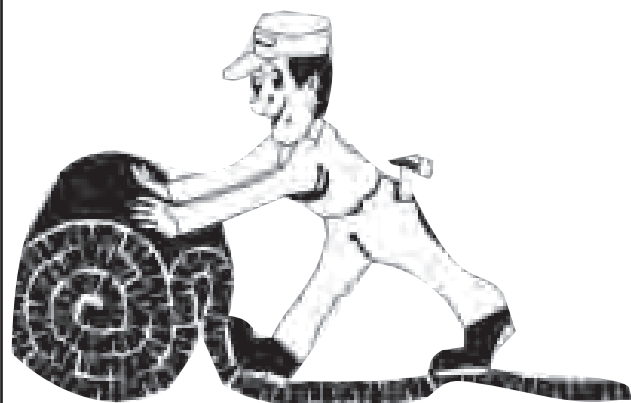

CONSTITUTION

Article I – Organizational Name

The name of this organization shall be the Attica Independent Junior Fair Board.

Article II – Purpose

The purpose of this organization shall be to coordinate the activities of the Junior Fair, to cooperate with the Senior Fair Board and to promote the general well-being of the fair.

Article III – Membership

Section 1 – Membership Rules:

A member must be no younger than 13 years and no older than 19 years of age to be a member of the Attica Junior Fair Board. To be eligible for membership, the person must be associated with the Junior Fair. To become a member, he/she shall be selected by submitting a completed Junior Fair application form. Acceptance and membership to the board is an agreement to complete the rules and responsibilities of the Junior Fair Board. The term will run for two years Jan-Jan as long as 80% participation is maintained, otherwise you need to reapply as a new member. Members will also be required to maintain a liaison between the fair board and their 4-H Club or organization, relating pertinent information. There may only be a maximum of 4 members per Club or Group. The maximum of 45 members is allowed.

Section 2 – Absentees:

All members should attend all meetings. Any member missing two meetings unexcused by Junior Fair Advisor shall have their name placed before the Junior Fair board for a decision of removal from the board.

Article IV – Officers

Section 1 – Officers:

The organization shall elect people for the following offices: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Reporter. Officer election shall be held during the February meeting. Officers shall be selected by secret ballot. All officers are to show up ½ hour early to help prepare for the meeting. If an officer fails his job

duty for the second consecutive meeting a new officer will be elected.

Section 2 – Officers' Duties:

The President of this organization shall preside at all the meetings and see that the organization's rules are followed.

The Vice-President shall preside at meetings in the absence of the president and shall serve on committees as directed by the President. Vice shall assist other officers in their absences.

The Secretary shall keep accurate records of the events of each meeting.

The Treasurer shall keep accurate records of the organization's expenditures and receipts.

The Reporter shall write up an article of the happenings of each meeting and put it in the Attica area newspaper.

Article V – Advisory Members

Section 1: Superintendent

The Senior Fair Board will appoint a Junior Fair Advisory Committee who will serve as advisors for the Attica Junior Fair and the Attica Independent Junior Fair Board.

Section 2 – Senior Fair Board Representation:

There may be a Senior Fair Board Member at each meeting to supervise and represent the Senior Fair Board.

Section 3 – Meeting Time: 6:30 p.m.

The meetings of the Attica Independent Junior Fair Board shall be held every second Sunday of each month at the Attica Fairgrounds in the Junior Fair office (Subject to change). When a holiday falls on the second Sunday, the meeting will be held on the third Sunday.

JUNIOR FAIR & EXHIBITOR GUIDELINES

1. Entries are open to any boy or girl who is a member of a 4-H club. Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Farm Bureau Youth, Youth Grange or SCSHA registered in **Seneca County**.

2. Entries are open to any boy or girl who is a member of FFA Vocational Agriculture, FHA, or Home Economics, attending a **Seneca County School**.

3. **ABSENT EXHIBITOR** due to illness, injury or school commitments, the exhibitor must contact the Junior Fair Advisor, and another active Jr. Fair exhibitor can show the absent exhibitor's project.

4. If an exhibitor has two animals in the same class, he/she must have another **ACTIVE** Attica Jr. Fair exhibitor show the second animal.

5. **EXHIBITOR AGE** must be between the ages of 8 years and 18 years of age as of January 1st of the current year, except for FFA exhibitors who can show to age 19.

6. **ENTRIES** must be turned in to the Junior Fair Department by June 15th of the calendar year to be exhibited. Entries are

to be mailed or dropped off to Erin Swartzmiller 6153 US Highway 224 Attica, Ohio 44807. Forms must be completely filled out and signed by the exhibitor and parent. **Incomplete and late entries will not be accepted!**

7. **Exhibits must be the product of the current project year and must be in place by 5:00PM the day preceding the fair.**

8. Any club, organization or exhibitor displaying a project in the Block Building is required to patrol at an assigned time. Failure to patrol will result in Booth Set-up Award being withheld.

9. Parties involving adults, youth and/or Junior Fair youth will not be permitted in the barn area.

10. Parties involving the use of alcohol and/or drugs will not be permitted. Violators will be expelled from the fair.

11. Exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in an orderly and courteous manner at all times. Harassment, profanity, misconduct, vandalism, and abuse of code of conduct will not be tolerated. Violators and their exhibits will be dismissed from the fair and will forfeit all premiums.

12. All decisions concerning a decision by the Attica Junior Fair advisory committee is considered final with the Attica Senior Fair board approval.

13. Exhibitors will only be permitted to stay overnight during the fair on the fairgrounds in assigned camping area with an adult 21 years of age and/or guardian.

14. **A Curfew of 12:00 Midnight will be enforced. All exhibitors are to be in their living quarters at that time. All unauthorized persons must leave the Fairgrounds.**

15. No one will be permitted to stay in the barns overnight.

16. There will be no sleeping in vehicles or livestock trailers.

17. Violations of any Attica Junior Fair Rules and Exhibitors Guidelines, Attica Junior Fair Departments, Attica Livestock Sale Guidelines, Attica Fair Exhibitions Guidelines, county and/or state exhibition guidelines by an Attica Junior Fair Exhibitor can be expelled from the Attica Fair, lose all privileges of the Attica Junior Fair which includes exhibiting, premiums, awards, selling at the Junior Fair Livestock Sale and Junior Fair passes. Recommendations will be proposed by the Attica Junior Fair Advisory Committee and acted upon by the Attica Senior Fair Boards. A written letter will be sent to the Junior Fair violator by the Attica Junior Fair Advisory Committee with the results of their decision.

18. All goats and sheep must be identified with official USDA identification compliant with scrapie regulations. (USDA approved ear tag, approved tattoo

or microchip.) Proper paperwork for tattoos and/or microchip must be filed with the Attica Junior Fair office upon weigh-in/check-in of the animal. (Ohio Administrative Code 901:1-13-04)

19. AWARD WINNERS (trophies, awards, plaques, etc) must send a "Thank you" note to the donor. This "Thank You" note is to be delivered no later than October 1st to the Junior Fair Office in a stamped, sealed, and addressed envelope for recording. Failure to do so will result in withholding of premiums until the "Thank You" note is sent. Write the award that was received and a return address on the back of the envelope.

20. Pen assignments will be done by the Dept. Superintendents, Junior Fair Board and Junior Fair Coordinator. Exhibits must be exhibited where assigned according to Departments, Club or Chapter. Moving of animals to pens or stalls not assigned to them will not be permitted to show for premiums, awards or to sell at the livestock sale

21. Wire may not be used to secure pen openings, feed and water dishes.

22. All VETERINARY BILLS incurred by the animal or the exhibitor during the exhibition days of the Attica Independent Fair will be the responsibility of the exhibitor or parent/guardian of the exhibitor. If the animal is held for drug testing or any other reason the cost incurred (housing, feed, transport vet etc.) in the care will be passed on to the exhibitor and their guardian.

23. Eligible youth may be members of both 4-H Club and FFA Chapter, or of either group. When a student belongs to both organizations, projects carried, in all cases, must be separate and different (also different animals and/or products) in an effort to broaden the student's experience and learning. The following examples will be considered separate and different projects – dairy heifers not freshened; sheep breeding; commercial market lambs; beef breeding; market beef (steers); swine breeding, market hogs, market goats and breeding goats; horse production, horse riding, laying flock, broiler; market rabbits, fancy rabbits (must be different breeds); agronomic crops such as corn, soybeans, wheat and specialty such as vegetable gardening, strawberries, electricity, woodworking, and other specialty animals and crops which must also be separate and different.

24. The Attica Independent Fair Association and the Attica Junior Fair Board will not be responsible for any LOSS & DAMAGE which may occur.

25. All Exhibitors must have written permission slip available from the Jr. Fair Coordinator, signed by club's advisor and exhibitor, requesting EARLY RELEASE of stated NON-LIVESTOCK projects and

reason for early release. The permission slips must be presented to the Attica Junior Fair Coordinator two weeks prior to the start of the fair.

26. Exhibitors cannot serve as an advisor or department head.

FAIR PASSES

27. To be entitled to a Junior Fair pass, you must be an Attica Junior Fair Exhibitor or Advisor of an Attica Junior Fair Exhibitor showing for premium. Names of Attica Junior Fair exhibitors requiring junior fair passes must be emailed (atticajrfair@gmail.com) or sent to Erin Swartzmiller 6153 US Highway 224 Attica, Ohio 44807 no later than June 15th. Passes are to be picked up on the Sunday before fair week from 1:00-4:00 p.m. at the Entertainment Building during Judging or after 4:00 p.m. in the Jr. Fair Office, also on the Monday before fair week from 3:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. at the Junior Fair Office.

28. All livestock must go to the far East Gate (drive beyond camper drive) to Fair Veterinarian for approval before unloading.

29. Any market hog, lamb, steer, feeder calf, rabbit, goat and poultry previously exhibited at any other county or independent Junior Fair cannot be exhibited at the Attica Independent Junior Fair.

30. Pens, stalls and aisle ways not cleaned by the exhibitor at the conclusion of the Attica Fair, will forfeit all premiums.

NO EXCEPTIONS!

31. Junior Fair Board and Department Superintendents reserve the right to divide or combine classes for each show.

32. Any exhibitor observed being abusive or inhumane to animals on the grounds will be asked to leave, forfeit premiums, awards and lose all sale privileges.

NO EXCEPTIONS!

33. No loose straw should be lying in the aisles – bales must be tightly bundled. Exhibitor will be warned once. Repeat offense means forfeiture of premiums.

34. Stalls, pens and aisle ways must be clean and free from litter at all times during the fair to collect premium. Show boxes will be kept along outer perimeter of Beef and Small animal barn and above pen in the Goat, Sheep and Hog barn.

35. Exhibitors must furnish feed, bedding and equipment.

36. No one other than the exhibitor's immediate family members, exhibitor's advisor, or club member can help in getting an animal ready for showing. The exhibitor must assume the major part of the work.

37. Animals shown in breeding classes cannot be shown in market classes & vice-versa.

38. All purebreds must show registration papers at the Junior Fair Office for verification and recording in order to receive purebred premiums. A copy will be kept for recording.

39. Livestock cannot be removed prior to assigned times on the Sunday following the fair without the consent of the Junior Fair Advisory Committee. This date is subject to change by appropriation of the Attica Senior Fair Board.

40. ATTICA FAIR IS RACTOPAMINE (PAYLEAN) FREE. This means that all animals exhibited at the Attica fair must not have been fed/given Ractopamine (Paylean) in any form or at any time during their growing period.

41. Each exhibitor showing a market project at Attica, along with their parents, will have to sign an affidavit attesting to the fact that NO ractopamine (Paylean) in any form has been given to their hogs. Disciplinary action for violation of the Ractopamine free rule will be at the discretion of the Attica Fair Sale Committee and the Attica Sr. Fair Board.

42. ALL LIVESTOCK MUST BE FREE OF ALL CONTAGIOUS DISEASES!! Any animal(s) that are in question will be examined by the assigned veterinary. Removal will be to the discretion of the assigned fair veterinarian, Jr. Fair Advisory Committee and Sr. Fair Board.

43. Any animal that becomes sick during the fair can be released by the Fair Veterinarian.

44. In case of death of a project animal, the Livestock Sale Committee and Department Superintendent must be notified within 24 hours after death. (Replacement animal cannot be considered for class winner, champion or reserve champion and will be shown for grade only.)

45. Classes will be determined according to weight and number of animals. All classes will have 10 or less animals/exhibitors per class. All overweight and underweight animals will show in separate classes than animals weighing within the weight limits. Overweight and underweight animals will not be allowed to show for grand or reserve champion.

46. Any animal considered being unruly and a danger to the public and/or other animals will be sent home at any time during the Attica Fair. A majority vote by the Attica Senior Fair is needed in order to release the animal.

47. Tampering with animal ear tags, ear notches, tattoos or brands is cause for immediate dismissal from the Attica Fair.

48. All animals must be fed, watered and properly cared for the duration of the Attica Fair, especially market animals after

the livestock sale and until the projects are released on Sunday. If the animals do not have food and water at all times, the exhibitor forfeits all premiums and the money will be used to care for the animals, Livestock Sale money will be forfeited and returned to the buyer.

49. All grand and reserve market animals and all terminal animals which include market hogs, market steers, male market goats & male market sheep will be sent to processor, to be slaughtered, chosen by the livestock sale committee. Feeder calves will not be harvested because a feeder calf is not a marketable animal.

50. A parent has to attend a quality assurance meeting along with the first year 4-H/FFA member. Exhibitors with two or more years of livestock experience must also attend a QA meeting with/without a parent. Members that need to attend are those showing any market animal (steers, feeders, swine, sheep, goats, poultry, rabbits, lactating goats & dairy).

51. Quality Assurance must be completed by May 1st of the calendar year of the fair the exhibitor wishes to exhibit their animal.

52. DUNF will be filed

ELECTRONICALLY. All market animal exhibitors are required to fill out a drug use notification form, (DUNF). Market animals include: market steers, market goats, market hogs, market poultry, market rabbits, & market sheep. **THIS FORM MUST BE FILED ELECTRONICALLY PRIOR TO BRINGING YOUR ANIMAL TO WEIGH-IN. (NO paper copies will be accepted as of 2021.)** The Attica Fair 2-digit code is **48.**

53. Applying any electrical, mechanical, or other appliance to livestock repeatedly or for a prolonged time period is in violation of section 313.2 of the United States code of federal regulations.

54. Hitting, striking, beating or otherwise impacting livestock that induces swelling or enhances, transforms or changes the true conformation, configuration, or appearance of the livestock is unacceptable.

55. Plugging or sealing of teats using unapproved substances or for longer than eighteen hours using approved substances is unacceptable.

56. Injecting material into udders or teats for non-medical purposes or otherwise artificially modifying the appearance or conformation of the udder or teat is unacceptable.

57. Using ice, ice pack, and/or cold pack compresses internally and/or externally other than a veterinarian's recommendation is unacceptable.

58. Using a stomach tube or pump for any purpose other than for the relief of

tympany or gas on the day of exhibiting is unacceptable.

59. If any exhibitor shall be found guilty of violating R.C. 901.76 & O.A.C. 901-19-04 per ODA the exhibitor may be disqualified after state review and all awards, prizes & premiums shall be forfeited.

60. All money that is collected for the above exhibitor will be divided between the Jr. Fair board and Sale Committee per Sr. Fair board decision.

61. A barn meeting will be held in the show arena immediately after all animals are weighed in. This is for exhibitors, parents, advisors and anyone wishing to attend. This is very informative and everyone is encouraged to attend.

62. All animals must be halter broke.

63. Exhibitors must show their own animals in showmanship classes.

64. Premium payouts will be passed out in the Jr. Fair office from **12:30-1:30p.m. on Sunday after all barns/booth areas have been cleaned**

65. Absolutely no drenching of any animals on the fairgrounds. If seen doing this, the project will need to be removed from the fairgrounds.

RECORD BOOKS & SKILLS CONTEST

Superintendent Committee

Advisor: Erin Swartzmiller

A. All market project books or livestock record books must be current and up to date as of the Saturday or Sunday before fair week.

B. The skills test is **MANDATORY** for livestock exhibitors (will be taken in the respective species barn) and optional for miscellaneous project exhibitors and will be taken in the Entertainment Building.

C. The skills test needs to be taken and livestock project books must be turned in the Sunday before the fair.

Premiums will go as follows:

"A" Book is fully completed and test was taken.

"B" Book is partially completed and test was taken.

"C" Book not turned in and/or test not taken and could result in not being able to show your project or compete for Champion or Reserve Champion or sell at the Attica Junior Fair Livestock Sale.



JUNIOR FAIR LIVESTOCK SALE

1. A market lamb weighing less than 90lbs. will show for grade only and is not eligible for champion placing.

2. Feeder calves must weigh from 350lbs to 600lbs.

3. Market hogs must weigh from 210lbs to 280lbs.

4. Rabbit meat pen 12 to 18 lbs. combine weight per meat pen.

5. Rabbit Fryer pen 4-6lbs.

6. Market goat weighing less than 50 pounds will show for grade only.

7. Meat pen of chickens will weigh no more than 27 pounds to be eligible for Grand/Reserve Champion.

8. Any animal not weighing the required weight for its own species will show in a lightweight or overweight class and is not eligible for Grand or Reserve champion.

9. A 4% commission will be charged to the exhibitor by the Attica Junior Fair Livestock Committee on all sales. These funds will be used by livestock committee for expenses of the sale such as but not limited to pictures, plaques, awards, ear tags, postage and advertising.

10. A 3% commission will be charged to the exhibitor on all sales to be distributed to the Attica Junior Fair Board and the Attica Fair Building Fund.

11. A check-off fee will be deducted from the exhibitor's livestock check.

12. Anyone wishing to take home a market animal that will not go through the commercial sale ring (feeder calf, female market goat, female market lamb), will pay a \$50.00 opt-out fee per animal. (This excludes any breeding projects.)

13. All Grand and Reserve Champion market animals must be sold at the livestock sale and will sell in the Sale of Champions.

14. Exhibitors of Grand or Reserve champion animals must secure buyers of

their champion animal prior to the Sale of Champions.

b. Exhibitors of OVERALL Grand & Reserve Champion Steers & Hogs must secure buyers of the meat from these animals.

14. Grand and Reserve Champion Livestock Sale checks will not be issued until all buyers have paid and Thank You cards have been received for the sale animal(s) by October 1st of exhibit year. For each week after Oct. 1st, \$10.00/week per exhibitor will be forfeited until all Thank You cards are complete. **All monies collected will be donated to a local non-profit organization.** Further disciplinary actions will be at the discretion of the Sale Committee and the Attica Sr. Fair board.

15. An Exhibitor's Livestock Sale check will be held until all Thank You notes have been received for buyers of the exhibitor's animal(s) by October 1st of exhibit year. For each week after Oct. 1st, \$10.00/week per exhibitor will be forfeited until all Thank You cards are complete. **All monies collected will be donated to a local non-profit organization.** Further disciplinary actions will be at the discretion of the Sale Committee and the Attica Sr. Fair board.

16. Champion buyers who spend \$150 or more will be issued a picture, if they choose, to display. Plaques will no longer be distributed. Once the sale of champions is complete the regular sale will begin.

17. There is a limit of 2 transactions per exhibitor permitted to be sold through the commercial sale ring. The designation of which animals will be sold is to be made at weigh-in by using the Sale Declaration Form.

a. If an animal not designated for sale at weigh-in wins Grand or Reserve champion, that animal must be substituted for the exhibitors designated sale animal to maintain the two (2) transaction limit.

b. Only exceptions to two (2) sale transaction limit: If an exhibitor has more than two (2) Grand or Reserve champion animals, all Grand and Reserve champion animals must sell.

18. The total number of animals that one exhibitor can have tagged, nose printed, picture or ear notched is as follows: Steers 4, Feeder calves 4, Market lambs 4, Market Hogs 4, & Market Goats 4.

19. In order for a feeder calf to participate in the commercial sale, the feeder calf must participate in the back to the farm sale.

20. The commercial buyer has first option of ownership on all commercial sales except feeder calves, rabbits and poultry. If the commercial buyer wishes to buy the actual animal, the commercial buyer will need to pay the base price in addition to the commercial bid.

21. There will be **NO DRESSED & DELIVERED for rabbits and poultry. ALL market rabbits and market poultry are terminal and will go to packer/processor.**

22. Only animals shown in the Junior Fair market classes are eligible to sell in the Junior Fair Livestock Sale.

23. All animals not purchased through commercial sale for Bellevue Meats will have freight charges of \$20.00 per head added on.

24. Show numbers will not be used and show harnesses are prohibited.

25. Sale checks must be cashed within 6 months from the date issued.

26. ALL market hogs, market poultry, market rabbits, male market lambs, male market goats and steers are terminal and must go to processor/packer chosen by the Attica Jr. Fair Livestock Sale Committee.

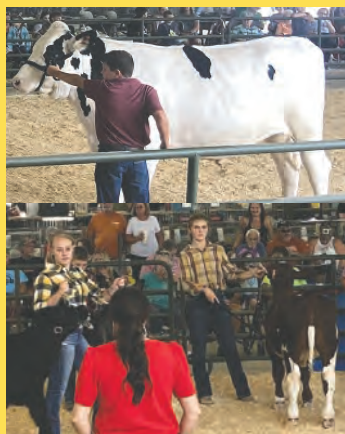

A. NO MULCH may be used for bedding for Beef and/or Feeder calf project animals. **ONLY** straw or pine shavings may be used.

B. All cattle must be tied with a rope halter as well as a neck rope.

C. No more than 4 bales of straw and 2 bales of hay are permitted in the cattle barn or the small animal barn at any time.

D. All feeder calves must be castrated by June 15 and must be dehorned. Spot check may be done after this date by the Livestock Sale Committee. Castration must be performed by total removal of the testes. Noncompliance will mean removal of calf from the Attica Fair. Each calf will not show and will not sell. Each calf will be checked by a veterinarian.

E. Dairy Feeder Calves must be 100% dairy animals or dairy/dairy cross.

F. Beef Feeder Calves must be 100% beef.

G. Dairy-Beef Feeders –dairy and beef cross.

H. Beef Feeders must be weaned from cow 60 days before the fair.

I. Must be vaccinated for IBR, BVD, BRSV, PI3 and Pasteurella. Two doses are required with the first dose being on or around June 1 and second dose being on or around July 1. At least one set of vaccinations **MUST** be administered by a licensed veterinarian and the vaccination form must be signed by the veterinarian. Documentation of vaccines is required on forms available from Jr. Fair office.

J. No calf will be shown or sold at the Attica Fair Livestock Sale unless pictures are submitted to the Jr. Fair. Three (3) pictures need to be submitted (front, left side and right side) the exhibitor must be clearly visible in each picture. They must include exhibitors name, address, phone number, club, & breed on the back of each picture. These are due April 30 of the current year.

K. Calves must be born and in the possession of the exhibitor by April 30.

L. All feeder calves must have a rope halter put on after the sale. The rope halter will be returned to the exhibitor. (Twine halters are not acceptable)

M. Feeder heifers and feeder steers will be shown together not in separate classes. Beef will show with beef, dairy will show with dairy, & dairy-beef will show with dairy-beef.

N. A total of 2 feeder calves in any combination of beef, dairy or dairy-beef can be exhibited by one exhibitor.

O. Feeder calves must weigh from 350lbs to 600lbs.

A. ATTICA FAIR IS RACTOPAMINE (PAYLEAN) FREE.

This means that all hogs exhibited at the Attica fair must not have been fed/given Ractopamine (Paylean) in any form or at any time during their growing period.

B. Each exhibitor showing hogs at Attica, along with their parents, will have to sign an affidavit attesting to the fact that NO ractopamine (Paylean) in any form has been given to their hogs. Disciplinary action for violation of the Ractopamine free rule will be at the discretion of the Attica Fair Sale Committee and the Attica Sr. Fair Board.

C. Swine exhibitors must store all equipment and feed on top of the pens or in empty pens.

D. All market hogs are to be in the possession of the exhibitor by May 15 of the current year.

E. Slick clipping or body shaving of hair on market hogs, except ears, tail and underline is PROHIBITED. Hair length of market hogs can be checked at any time during the fair. A committee of three members, one being a Sr. Fair Board member, will measure the length of flexible hair on the market hogs. Any hog whose hair does not meet a minimum required length of 1/2" will not be permitted to show or sell.

F. No straw or mulch shall be used, wood shavings only.

G. Hogs must be fully castrated. If not, exhibitor will not be able to show for grand/reserve champion.

H. A total of 2 market hogs in any combination of barrow or gilt can be exhibited by one exhibitor.

I. Market hogs must weigh from 210lbs to 280lbs.

J. Only **ONE** (1) hog pen will be allowed per market hog exhibitor.

A. Exhibitor's area must be kept clean and free of excess bedding at all times. Only wood shavings can be used for bedding. Absolutely no straw!

B. Pens are to be cleaned each day of the fair and the manure hauled to the manure spreaders.

C. Pullets may be up to one year old the day of the show.

D. Meat chickens are suggested to be hatched no later than June 25th.

E. Entries in meat pen can be any commercial meat type of dual-purpose poultry.

F. All classes will follow APA standards.

G. Meat ducks must be hatched on June 1, or later.

H. Poultry meat pen will be weighed individually during weigh-in from 3:30 p.m. – 5:00p.m. on receiving day in the poultry barn. **NO LATER**

I. Turkey suggested hatch date is February 26 or later. They should be 18-20 weeks old at the fair with minimum weight of 25lbs at weigh-in to be eligible for Grand/Reserve Champion.

J. Meat pen of chickens, has a 27-pound pen weight limit and should be a minimum of 6 weeks old at the fair.

K. All poultry must have a Form 9-3 hatch paper for all exhibits to be turned in at weigh in time. Failure to have hatch papers will result in being sent home. All poultry must be pullorum tested (if antigen available) before coming to the fair or have NPPI papers, excluding waterfowl and pigeons. **THIS IS A STATE LAW.**

L. All leg bands must be turned in at the time it is sent to processor or the exhibitor's premium will be forfeited.

M. A total of 2 meat pens of chickens, 2 meat pens of ducks, 2 meat pens of geese, 2 meat pens of turkeys can be exhibited by one exhibitor.

N. A total of 2 entries per class per exhibitor

O. If exhibitor does not feel the cages provided are not adequate for bird size, they are able to bring in their own cage that is approved by superintendent a week before the fair

DEPARTMENT 6 RABBITS

A. Breed classes will consist of A.R.B.A. recognized breeds. All rules governing the A.R.B.A. **Rabbit exhibitors must submit the breed and sex of their rabbits on their entry form to show they comply with their project requirements.** Failure to do so will result in not being permitted to show for premium

B. ALL RABBITS MUST BE IN THE EXHIBITOR'S POSSESSION BY MAY 1st OF THE CURRENT YEAR.

C. An exhibitor must have taken a Breeding Rabbit project at least one year to be eligible to take a Market Rabbit project.

D. A mixed breed rabbit may be shown by a first-year exhibitor only. After the first year the exhibitor must show a purebred rabbit.

E. Rabbits will be shown by breed and sex. Rabbits must be shown out of their pens by the exhibitor. If help is needed for a younger exhibitor an older exhibitor may help. **At no time should a parent place or remove a rabbit from the show table.**

F. Breed Champions will compete for Champion and Reserve Champion Purebred Rabbit.

G. Grand & Reserve Champion Meat Pen and Grand & Reserve Champion Fryer must go to packer bid. Not eligible for dressed & delivered.

H. A total of 2 meat pens of rabbits or 2 fryers or 1 meat pen & 1 fryer can be exhibited by one exhibitor

I. Meat Pen Rules are as follows.

1. Meat pens must contain 3 rabbits approximately 100 days old.

2. Each individual rabbit must weigh between 4-6 pounds. Total weight of pen of three is 12-18 pounds.

3. Meat pen rabbits will be weighed individually during weigh-in on the receiving day.

4. Meat pen rabbits must have been born at the exhibitor's home from a doe owned by the exhibitor.

5. Meat pen rabbits will not be allowed to show in breed classes.

6. The exhibitor must meet all requirements of his/her project in order to show and sell a meat pen.

J. Fryer Pen Rules are as follows.

1. Fryer will be 1 rabbit approximately 100 days old.

2. Rabbit must weigh between 4-6 pounds.

3. Fryer rabbit will be weighed individually during weigh-in on the receiving day.

4. Fryer rabbit must have been born at the exhibitor's home from a doe owned by the exhibitor.

5. Fryer rabbit will not be allowed to show in breed classes.

6. The exhibitor must meet all requirements of his/her project in order to show and sell a Fryer rabbit.

K. Exhibitors must keep their exhibit area clean at all times or premiums will be forfeited.

L. All feed/supply containers must fit on or under the shelving in the rabbit barn. There is not to be any boxes, crates, etc. sitting on, below or beside the rabbit cages. If the box doesn't fit on or under the end shelves, then you must take it home. All pens must have manure removed each day to the manure spreader. Only clean wood shavings. **ABSOLUTELY NO STRAW IS TO BE USED UNDER OR IN THE CAGES!!**

M. Each rabbit being entered and shown or premium will be checked upon entering the barn to verify if it complies with the project guidelines and entry of the exhibitor. Any discrepancy will result in the entire project being sent home and no premium awarded.

N. Rabbits must be permanently tattooed in left ear before checking in at rabbit barn or the rabbit will not be allowed to be exhibited.

O. No padlocks are allowed on the cages. Small zip ties may be used if needed.

P. The exhibitor's cage must be cleaned, manure removed to the spreader and the cage cleaned and folded for storage before the rabbit(s) will be released from the barn.

Q. Each individual rabbit must be entered on the entry forms. (2 rabbits - 2 listings) Rabbit breed and sex must be listed with each rabbit entered. Each meat pen, even though it consists of 3 rabbits, will be listed as one entry and does not need breed or sex of rabbits listed.

R. An exhibitor may exhibit a Breeding or Market Level I for two years then must advance to Level II; an exhibitor may exhibit at Breeding or Market Level II for two years then must advance to Level III; an exhibitor may exhibit at Breeding or Market Level III for more than two years.

Superintendent Committee

A. At the conclusion of the sheep show all blocking stands must be removed from the barns. No electric sheering of sheep on fairgrounds.

B. Market Lambs are to be slick sheared within six weeks prior to the show.

C. All wool clippings must be cleaned up and removed from inside and outside the barns.

D. Market lamb tagging will be held the first Saturday in May, all lambs must have a USDA scrapie tag/tattoo in their ear. If at weigh in the lamb does not have this it will not be permitted on the grounds.

E. Market Lambs must have dry wool for weigh-in at the fair. Lambs having wet wool will be expelled from showing for premiums, awards and selling privileges.

F. No evidence of testicles can be present in a wether.

G. Butt wool will not be allowed.

H. Exhibitors with sheep breeding exhibits can either enter in the purebred or crossbred classes, **but not both.**

I. All grand & reserve market sheep along with all male market sheep will be sent to the processor chosen by the livestock sale committee.

J. No straw or mulch shall be used, wood shavings only.

K. A total of 2 market lambs can be exhibited by one exhibitor

L. A market lamb weighing less than 90lbs. will show for grade only and is not eligible for champion placing

Pen of Two Market Lambs

1. The pen of two market lamb class will take place after the market lamb show.

2. Lambs being awarded champion and reserve champion cannot compete in the pen of two class.

3. There will not be any premiums paid out in the pen of two classes, because premiums were already awarded in the market lamb class as singles.

Breeding Flock of Three

1. Breeding sheep flock is to consist of the following: 1 ram, 2 ewes – the ewes can be either yearlings, lambs or a combination of the two.

2. The purebred and grade breeding flocks will compete for awards at the conclusion of the breeding singles classes.

3. There will not be any premiums paid out for the class, because premiums were already awarded in the sheep breeding singles classes.

Bred, Born & Raised Lamb Show

A. The exhibitor's lamb must be bred, born & raised in Seneca County with entry form signed by breeder. Entry form must be turned in at time of fair registration, last Wednesday of June of current year.

B. The exhibitor must show their own lamb.

C. An exhibitor may enter one (1) county lamb in the show.

DEPARTMENT 8
SHOWMANSHIP RULES

1. Age of exhibitor is age of member as of January 1 of current year.

2. Divisions: Beef, Feeders, Goats, Hogs, Poultry, Rabbits, Sheep
Junior – Ages 8-11 years.
Intermediate – Ages 12-14 years.
Senior Ages 15 and older.

(All ages are as of January 1st of the current year.)

3. Advanced entry is required. Sign up will be posted in the Jr. Fair Office. Your name can be deleted at any time but may not add after set times. **Exhibitors will be able to sign up until 6:00 p.m. the night before their show.**

4. The classes will be divided up by the judge's request with no more than 10 exhibitors per class.

5. All 4-H and FFA livestock exhibitors are encouraged to participate.

6. Exhibitors must be carrying the project and exhibiting the animal at the Attica Fair to compete in Showmanship classes.

7. Exhibitor must show his/her own animal.

8. Junior, intermediate, & senior showmanship can be won only once by an exhibitor per department.

9. Previous winners cannot compete in the same age group again. Winners are to advance to the next age group except senior division which cannot advance until they have won the senior division. Once an exhibitor has won the senior division, they are only eligible to compete in super showmanship.

10. Super showmanship for each department is for all past senior showmanship and super showmanship winners and the winners of the current senior division, current intermediate division, and current junior division of said department.

11. If a junior or intermediate showman participates in super showmanship and does not win, they will move up one division the following year.

12. In super showmanship if an exhibitor would win in two departments, they are required to decide which department they want to represent in the Showman of Showmen competition. The second-place winner would then represent the other department.

PEE WEE SHOWMANSHIP

1. This special show is for Pre-Junior Fair Exhibitors ages 4 years through 8 years and is limited to family members and friends of the exhibitors.

2. This show is strictly education, fun and to further the interest of projects.

3. Participants must have permission from the owners of the animal in order to participate.

4. Animals for this show must be an animal project from a Junior Fair Exhibitor. No outside animals may be brought onto the Fairgrounds.

5. All participants will receive a participation award.

6. All departments will have their pee-wee show after their showmanship contest.
